# COVID-19 public information update

This update contains new information and some changed advice since the last update. It is current as at 12pm 10 July but advice can change quickly. Further updates will be provided if or when things change.

Travel restrictions and quarantine rules for the Northern Territory will change on 17 July 2020. This update provides information about the rules right now, as well as what will change on 17 July.

#### Details of new case recorded in Darwin

A short time ago, the NT's Minister for Health confirmed that a person in Darwin has tested positive for COVID-19 or coronavirus, bringing the NT's active case count to 2.

The information available to date is that the person is a 21 year old US man on deployment in Darwin. The person arrived in Darwin on 8 July through a charter flight and transited through the military section of Darwin airport.

Health authorities have advised that the person has been complying with the current guidelines and was quarantining at Robertson Barracks since arriving. The person has had no contact with the public.

The Chief Health Officer has confirmed that the person is now receiving treatment at Royal Darwin Hospital.

All 32 cases of COVID-19 in the NT are related to international or interstate travel, with no known cases of community transmission to date.

#### Situation in East Arnhem

There are no known cases of coronavirus in the East Arnhem region.

## What should people do if they are feeling unwell?

If you are concerned that you have respiratory symptoms (fever, chills, sweating, sore throat, cough, runny nose, shortness of breath), please call a clinic to talk about getting tested for coronavirus. Please do not go directly to the clinic.

You may contact <u>your local Miwatj clinic</u>, or if you are on Gove Peninsula, you can call the Gove District Hospital Pandemic number on 0476 828 005. If the clinics are closed, call the national advice hotline on 1800 020 080.

## WHAT ARE THE ARRANGEMENTS UP UNTIL 17 JULY 2020?

Anyone travelling into the Northern Territory from interstate up to and including 16 July 2020 must complete mandatory self-quarantine.

## What is mandatory self-quarantine?

Self-quarantine is when people undertake a 14 day quarantine period in their own home, in private accommodation, or in appropriate commercial accommodation at their own cost.

#### Are there any restrictions on where people can self-quarantine?

Yes. In the East Arnhem region, the only place interstate travellers may quarantine is the town of Nhulunbuy.

Other places within the Territory where travellers may undertake self-quarantine include Darwin, Palmerston, Litchfield (except Litchfield National Park and Dundee Beach), Katherine, Tenant Creek and Alice Springs.

## What forms do people need to complete if they are entering the Territory?

Anyone entering the Northern Territory must complete a <u>pre-arrival border crossing application</u>, which can be done online in around 10 minutes.

#### Is it possible to be exempt from mandatory self-quarantine?

A person may <u>apply for an exemption self-quarantine</u> if they are in an <u>exempt category</u>. Please note that these applications can take some weeks to process.

No exemptions will be issued for people travelling from hotspots. All exemptions from self-quarantine for people who have travelled from hotspots have been revoked. People intending to travel to the Territory from a hotspot are strongly urged to reconsider their plans.

## What about travel within the East Arnhem region?

Permits are required for all Balanda who want to enter onto Aboriginal land – and outside of Nhulunbuy, the entire East Arnhem region is Aboriginal land. As part of protecting East Arnhem communities, there are restrictions in place on who will be issued a permit by the Northern Land Council to enter Aboriginal land to limit unnecessary travel and reduce the risk of introduction of COVID-19 into the region.

Over the last few weeks, there have been some changes to the reasons for which a <u>Northern Land Council permit</u> may be issued:

- Work related permit applications will be considered on a case-by-case basis
- Individual recreation permit applications will not be considered except where:
  - o It is a tourist permit related to visiting the region where the person has a booking at a relevant tourism operator (e.g. campground or other accommodation booking)
  - o It is a permit to access sea country for the purposes of recreational fishing
- All permit applications must be accompanied by a COVID-19 travel and health declaration.

## WHAT ARE THE ARRANGEMENTS AFTER 17 JULY 2020?

On 17 July, the Territory will lift interstate border restrictions, however restrictions will still apply to people travelling from areas declared as <u>'hotspots'</u> – they will be required to complete mandatory supervised quarantine.

#### What is a 'hotspot'?

To prevent people who have travelled from high risk areas entering the Northern Territory, the Chief Health Officer can declare the area a hotspot. As at 8 July 2020, the entire State of Victoria has been declared as a hotspot, and will remain so indefinitely.

Other areas might be declared to as <u>hotspots</u> in the future.

#### What will people travelling from hotspots need to do from 17 July?

People intending to travel to the Territory from a hotspot are strongly urged to reconsider their plans.

If people from a hotspot do enter the Northern Territory, they will need to complete 14 days of mandatory supervised quarantine at their own expense.

#### What is mandatory supervised quarantine?

Mandatory supervised quarantine will be at the Howard Springs quarantine facility, or another approved facility elsewhere in the Northern Territory. People in mandatory supervised quarantine will be charged a fee of \$2,500 per person.

People in supervised quarantine will be subject to testing before exiting quarantine. If they refuse a test, they will be required to quarantine for a further 10 days (at an extra cost).

#### What forms will people need to complete if they are entering the Territory from 17 July?

Regardless of where they are coming from – even if they are not coming from a hotspot – everyone entering the Northern Territory must complete a <u>pre-arrival border crossing application</u>, which may be done online in around 10 minutes.

## Can anyone be exempt from mandatory supervised quarantine?

No. There is no process to apply for an exemption from mandatory supervised quarantine for people travelling from hotspots.
